9 DAYS / 8 NIGHTS

Itinerary

Day 1 / Puerto Montt, Embarkation

Your journey begins in Puerto Montt, Chile, with boarding between 3 and 4 PM (15:00 – 16:00 hr.)

Day 2 / Puerto Cisnes

We head south to the village of Puerto Cisnes, in the remote region of Aysén, for an afternoon visit. We visit the seaport and explore the area, with its many fjords, islands, and channels. We hope to visit Magdalena Island, where we have a good chance of seeing penguins, cormorants, sea lions, and river otters.

Day 3 / San Rafael

The expedition continues with a full day of activities planned at San Rafael Bay. Declared a Biosphere Reserve, the park is the main entry point to Chile's Northern Icefields. San Rafael Glacier is the main attraction, but we will also enjoy exploring the surrounding fjords, channels, islands, and coves.

Day 4 / Gulf of Penas

We cross the Gulf of Penas, enjoying beautiful views of the surrounding mountain ranges. As we continue to sail southward, the expedition team tells you about the indigenous inhabitants of these southern lands, the early Spanish colonizers, and famous explorers such as Charles Darwin, Fitz Roy, and Alberto de Agostini. You also learn about the region's biodiversity with presentations on the local marine life and flora.

Day 5 / Puerto Eden

We sail the dramatic, 18 mt-wide English Narrows on our way to the famous fishing village of Puerto Eden, one of Chile's most isolated settlements. The village sits on the eastern side of Wellington Island and is only accessible by sea. Puerto Eden has no roads. Instead, a network of wooden boardwalks connects the houses and establishments. Rich evergreens cover the landscape steeped in indigenous traditions and culture, being home to the Kawéskar people.

Day 6 / Madre de Dios Island

We continue sailing south towards Madre de Dios Island, part of an uninhabited archipelago west of the Trinidad Channel and Concepción Channel. The island is composed partly of limestone, with

several natural caves that create a unique landscape evocatively named Marble Glaciers. In one of those caves, skeletons of whales 2600 to 3500 years old have been discovered. Many caves near the coast were used in the past as burial sites by the Kawéskar people. The whole region is an ideal place for exploration.

Day 7 / Strait of Magellan and Tierra del Fuego

While cruising along the Strait of Magellan, we explore the waters of the fjords that branch out from Tierra del Fuego, a region named after the fires that burned in local native settlements when the first European explorers arrived. We follow the remote coast around the Francisco Coloane Marine Park, a protected area in the southern hemisphere where whales feed. If you are lucky, you may be able to witness Humpback or Sei whales breaching in the distance. You may also see dolphins, sea lions, seals, penguins, albatrosses, and petrels.

Day 8 / Beagle Channel

We continue along the Beagle Channel, a striking narrow passage, partly belonging to Chile and partly to Argentina. We sail along Glacier Alley, a 240 km (150 mi) stretch within the Channel in Southern Chile, home to a family of five glaciers: the Holanda, Italia, Francia, Alemania, and Romanche glaciers. We hope to explore the Garibaldi Fjord where we will be surrounded by hanging and tidewater glaciers; nearby waterfalls are so close they can almost be touched. Spectacular ice formations are sprawled along the sea, forming part of the Southern Patagonian Ice field and the snow-dusted Darwin Range. It is a perfect time to enjoy the graceful view and, if possible, get a glimpse of sea lions and steamer ducks. The Beagle Channel, with the Strait of Magellan to the north and the Drake Passage to the south, is one of the three navigable passages in South America connecting the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans. On our way to Ushuaia, Argentina, the largest settlement on the channel, we will make a brief nighttime technical stop in Port Williams to comply with Chilean customs and immigration requirements.

Day 9 / Ushuaia, Disembarkation

Arrival in Ushuaia and disembarkation.

Falklands (Malvinas) & South Georgia

17 DAYS / 16 NIGHTS

Itinerary

Day 1 / Punta Arenas, Embarkation

From 9:00 hrs., make your way to Explorers House in Punta Arenas and enjoy the facilities. At 16:00 hrs., a group transfer will take you to the port for embarkation. As we sail along the Strait of Magellan, our Expedition Team will introduce the history of this fabled sea route.

Day 2 / At Sea

Enjoy the ship's hospitality as we make our way to the Falklands (Malvinas). Our engaging series of lectures and presentations begin.

Day 3 / Saunders Island, Carcass Island

We enjoy the long white-sand beach during a morning visit to Saunders Island. A wilderness experience, the main attractions are rockhopper penguins, nesting black-browed albatross, and sub-Antarctic gentoo penguins. In the afternoon, we visit Carcass Island. There is an option for an easy hike to the settlement, bird watching, and a typical Falklands tea experience.

Day 4 / Port Stanley

Join our expedition team on guided walking tours of Port Stanley or Gipsy Cove. Or explore on your own and absorb the atmosphere, grabbing lunch at the local pub, visiting the maritime museum, the church, hunting for souvenirs, or walking down Ross Road, paying tribute at the war memorials at the waterfront.

Day 5-6 / At Sea

As we sail towards South Georgia, attend presentations on the history and fauna of the archipelago. In the company of expert guides, watch for wildlife from the lounge or from the outside decks. You may spot magnificent seabirds, such as albatrosses and petrels, as well as different species of whales.

Day 7 / Elsehul Bay

Depending on sea conditions over the previous days, arrival is planned for the afternoon. Provided we receive approval from the South Georgia government, we plan to do an evening Zodiac cruise at Elsehul Bay.

Day 8 / Grytviken, Fortuna Bay

Our first landing is at Grytviken. We clear Customs and then visit the historical site with the museum and Ernest

Shackleton's grave. We land at Fortuna Bay / Stromness in the afternoon to see king penguins. Here we learn more about Shackleton and his expedition, and there is also an optional 2-3 hour "Shackleton walk."

Day 9 / Gold Harbour, Cooper Bay

In the morning, we plan a landing at Gold Harbour, a spectacular location with king penguins, elephant seals, and hanging glaciers. There are also sooty albatrosses here. In the afternoon and on a Zodiac cruise, we visit Cooper Bay to see macaroni penguins.

Day 10 / St Andrews Bay, Ocean Harbour

St Andrews Bay is the destination of our morning excursion. The highlights here are a shipwreck and the remains of the whaling industry. We see the largest king penguin colony and elephant seal bulls. We plan a Zodiac cruise in the afternoon and landing at Ocean Harbour.

Day 11 / Prion Island, Salisbury Plain

In the morning, we plan to visit Prion Island to see the nesting wandering albatross. In the afternoon, we head to Salisbury Plain for more king penguins and stunning landscapes.

Day 12-14 / At Sea

Our education program continues as we make our way back to the Falkland Islands (Islas Malvinas).

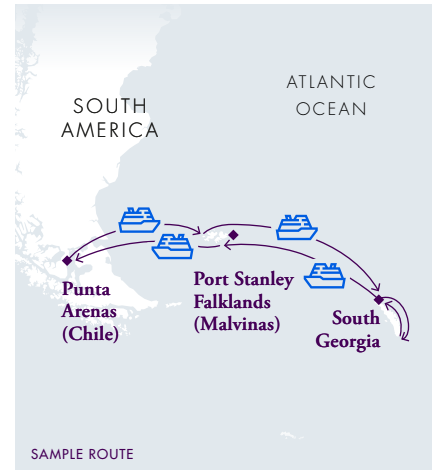
Day 15 / Bleaker Island

Evening landing at Bleaker Island, a natural reserve with a famous bird area featuring a large variety of birds.

Day 17 / Punta Arenas, Disembarkation

Upon arrival at Punta Arenas, we disembark and take a group transfer to the town center, where the expedition will end. Explorers House remains available to you for the day.

Itinerary

Day 1 / Punta Arenas, Embarkation

From 9:00 hrs., make your way to Explorers House in Punta Arenas and enjoy the facilities. At 16:00 hrs., a group transfer will take you to the port for embarkation. As we sail along the Strait of Magellan, our Expedition Team will introduce the history of this fabled sea route.

Day 2 / At Sea

Enjoy the ship's hospitality as we make our way to the Falklands (Malvinas). Our engaging series of lectures and presentations begins.

Day 3 / Saunders Island, Carcass Island

During a morning visit to Saunders Island, we enjoy the long white-sand beach. A wilderness experience, the main attractions are rockhopper penguins, nesting black-browed albatross, and sub-Antarctic gentoo penguins. In the afternoon, we visit Carcass Island. There is an option for an easy hike to the settlement, bird watching, and a typical Falklands tea experience.

Day 4 / Port Stanley

Join our expedition team on guided walking tours of Port Stanley or Gipsy Cove. Or explore on your own and absorb the atmosphere of this isolated outpost in the South Atlantic.

Day 5-6 / At Sea

Day 7 / Elsehul Bay

Evening Zodiac cruise at Elsehul Bay, subject to crossing and permits from the South Georgia government.

Day 8 / Grytviken, Fortuna Bay / Stromness

Morning landing at Grytviken. We'll clear Customs here, then visit the historical site, with the museum and Ernest Shackleton's grave. In the afternoon, we plan for a landing at Fortuna Bay / Stromness. We'll see king penguins and learn more about Shackleton

and his expedition. There is an optional 2-3 hour "Shackleton walk."

Day 9 / Salisbury Plain, Prion Island

Morning visit to Salisbury Plain for more king penguins and stunning landscapes. In the afternoon, visit Prion Island to see the nesting wandering albatross.

Day 10 / St. Andrews Bay, Cooper Bay

Morning visit to St. Andrews Bay. We'll see the largest king penguin colony and elephant seal bulls. In the afternoon, visit Cooper Bay to see macaroni penguins on a Zodiac cruise.

Day 11-12 / At sea

Day 13 / Elephant Island

In the afternoon, we will see Elephant Island. While a landing here is unlikely, we will see the island from the ship or, if sea conditions allow, from a Zodiac.

Day 14-17 / Antarctic Peninsula & South Shetland Islands

We cruise along the Antarctic Peninsula and among the South Shetland Islands, visiting sites in the Antarctic Sound and the Gerlache Strait. The voyage may include visits to sites such as Gourdin Island, Brown Bluff, Half Moon Island, Deception Island, Wilhelmina Bay, the Lemaire Channel, Cuverville Island, the Melchior Islands, or other magnificent places.

Day 18-19 / At sea

Day 20 / Ushuaia, Disembarkation

Arrival in Ushuaia and disembarkation.

Itinerary

Day 1 / Ushuaia, Embarkation

Your journey begins in Ushuaia, Argentina. Board your ship and sail along the Beagle Channel towards Antarctica.

Important note: Boarding in Ushuaia is exclusively between 15:00 hrs. and 16:00 hrs. At 16:00 hrs., boarding will close. Please be on time. Keep your passport on hand and allow enough time to clear port security and reach the vessel.

Day 2-3 / Crossing the Drake Passage

Sail towards Antarctica across the famous passage named in honor of Sir Francis Drake, the great 16th-century British explorer. As you sail en route to the South Shetland Islands, attend an engaging program of lectures and presentations. In the company of expert guides, watch for wildlife from the glass-enclosed lounge or the outside decks. You may spot magnificent sea birds, such as albatrosses and petrels, as well as different species of whales on their way south to Antarctica. After crossing the Antarctic Convergence, the environment changes noticeably. Keep your camera ready, as this is the time to watch for the first icebergs and the sight of Antarctic land.

Day 4-7 / Exploring Antarctica

Cruise between the South Shetland Islands and the western coast of the Antarctic Peninsula, sailing along ice-filled fjords and among spectacular icebergs while enjoying the company of sea birds, penguins, seals, and whales. Each day, disembark by Zodiac boat and explore the landscape together with expert polar guides. Enjoy spectacular vistas from the glass-enclosed lounge of the ship while sharing your daily adventures with fellow guests.

No journey is the same, as flexibility is the key to success in Antarctica. The Expedition Team sets the voyage route to take advantage of the ever-changing opportunities provided by nature, crafting a unique and extraordinary experience each time. While the exact itinerary changes with each expedition, you will explore several locations that offer the best possible overview of the varied Antarctic environment. Your voyage may include visits to sites such as Paulet Island, Hope Bay, Port Lockroy, Petermann Island, Paradise Bay, Deception Island, the Lemaire Channel,

or many other magnificent places. Our adventure will be very active, with several daily landings and cruises in Zodiacs, lectures, and a very enjoyable time on board. Departure from Antarctica will be in the afternoon or evening of Day 7, depending on weather conditions.

Day 8-9 / Sailing back to South America

Return to South America with a northbound crossing of the Drake Passage. Relax and take the time to watch for wildlife from the bridge or outside decks and participate in the presentations offered on Antarctic topics in the lounge.

Day 10 / Ushuaia, Disembarkation

The program ends upon arrival at the port in Ushuaia.

INNOVATIVE TECHNOLOGY · MODERN DESIGN

Magellan Explorer is a modern expedition vessel custom-built for our Antarctic air-cruises. The ship was constructed in Chile to the latest Polar Code specifications and launched in 2019.

For our air-cruises, Magellan Explorer has seven categories of accommodation, including dedicated single cabins. All cabins, except Porthole Cabins, feature private balconies. All double cabins, except ten, have twin beds, which can be configured as a king-size bed. All cabins feature a wardrobe, an individually controlled heating system, a sitting area, and a private bathroom with a shower.

The ship features a glass-enclosed observation lounge and presentation room with state-of-the-art audio-visual equipment, a spacious and stylish dining room, a well-stocked bar, a library, a meeting room, a gym, a sauna, and a medical clinic. The forward-facing observation deck leads to the ship's bow, which is accessible to guests to offer proximity to marine wildlife. The ship has a fleet of Zodiacs that are well-suited for disembarking and wildlife watching.

The fitness center aboard Magellan Explorer has been designed and built by the professionals at Anytime Fitness, the world's only fitness company with boutique gyms on all seven continents. For more information, see anytimefitness.com.

Ocean Nova

STRONG AND MIGHTY · ACTIVE ADVENTURE

Ocean Nova is a sturdy and nimble expedition vessel. This ship was built in Denmark in 1992 to sail the ice-choked waters of Greenland. It has an ice-strengthened hull that is ideally suited for expedition travel in Antarctica. Fully renovated in 2006, the ship has benefitted from annual upgrades and improvements since then.

Ocean Nova has a capacity for up to 71 guests accommodated in comfortable outside cabins. The ship offers three categories of accommodation: dedicated Single Cabins, Twin Cabins, and Triple Cabins. All cabins feature a picture window, a writing desk with a chair, a wardrobe, an individually controlled heating system, and a private bathroom with a shower.

In addition to a glass-enclosed observation lounge and presentation room, Ocean Nova also has a spacious dining room, a bar, a library, a small gym, and an infirmary. The ship has a fleet of 7 Zodiacs that are well suited for disembarking and wildlife watching.

Deposit

An initial deposit of \$3,500 USD per person is required to book a cabin, except for Patagonia & Chilean Fjords and Antarctic Small Ship Expeditions, where the deposit is \$1,500 USD per person.

The balance is due in full 120 days prior to departure. Payments can be made by wire transfer or credit card via PayPal. Wire transfer costs are to be borne by the sender. Credit card payments via PayPal are subject to a 2.7% fee (however, the 2.7% fee is not charged on the deposit). Payments received after the due date are subject to a \$250 USD per person late payment fee.

Children

Children are admitted from the age of 12 years if accompanied by an adult who will take responsibility and sign a waiver.

Single Travelers

Single travelers can choose between:

- Booking a dedicated Single Cabin: no supplement is applied for single use of dedicated Single Cabins.
- Booking a Twin Cabin for single use: an 85% supplement will be added to the rate per person when booking a limited number of Porthole and Veranda Cabins on Magellan Explorer and Twin Cabins on Ocean Nova. A 100% supplement applies when booking all other categories.
- Sharing a cabin with another passenger of the same gender: this is available on Magellan Explorer in Porthole and Veranda Cabins and on Ocean Nova in Twin Cabins. Antarctica21 will take care of finding the matching companion.

Note: Single travelers who use CPAP machines or other assistive devices, as well as those who have conditions that can be disrupting to others (loud snoring, sleepwalking, etc.), can only book their expedition in a Single Cabin or a Twin Cabin for single use. They cannot book on a twin-share basis.

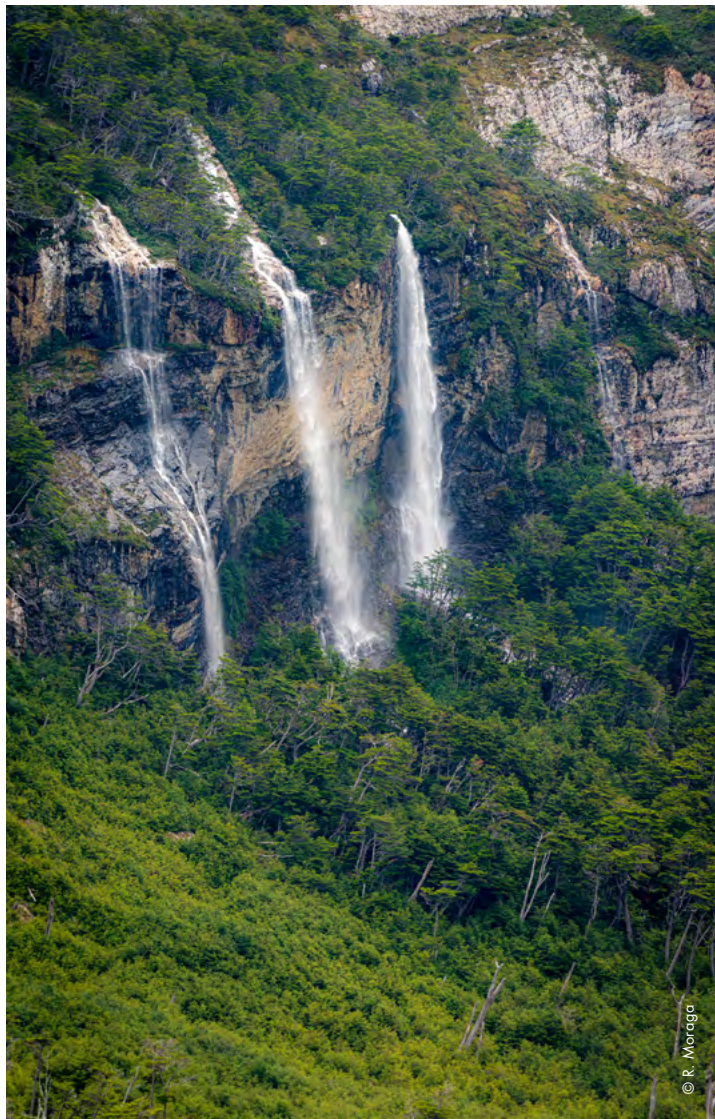

The Antarctica21 Expedition Experience

Mariano Curiel, Director of Expedition Operations, talks about the expedition experience in Antarctica and beyond.

What makes a trip an “expedition”?

The word expedition refers to a journey undertaken by a group of people with a particular purpose, such as exploration or research. With a lot of preparation and just as much flexibility, we lead expedition travelers to Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic islands to deepen their understanding of these remote and otherworldly places.

What surprises Antarctic travelers the most?

In my experience, the most significant impact comes from being exposed to such majestic expressions of nature. In the remote and extreme Antarctic environment, travelers see and feel things that go beyond what they know and are used to in their daily lives. It’s the same planet but feels different. For many, it is a life-changing experience.

How do you put together the expedition team?

Members of our expedition team must be able to perform at the highest level in extreme conditions; for extended periods of time. Our mission is to connect our guests to the places we explore. To become that link, the team not only needs hard technical skills, and experience, but empathy, which allows them to feel and understand the emotions of our guests. We focus on building diverse teams in terms of gender, nationality, skills, backgrounds, etc. Finally, we look for people who feel deep respect for the Antarctic environment. A team needs to be confident in their plans but ultimately humble to the forces of nature. It’s a unique profile we look for.

Antarctica21 only runs small-scale trips. How does that shape the experience?

It gives us several advantages. To begin with, the connection to the places we visit is qualitatively different: less noise, less distraction, a more intimate experience. Then, there is our flexibility: in extreme environments, the only guarantee is that there are no guarantees and plans will have to change. Our small-scale expeditions afford us a lot of flexibility, which is a huge operational advantage. It results in better daily routines. But probably the most important point is that we can establish a personal connection with our guests. We speak with them, listen, share, and find out what they are experiencing during their trip. That gives us a chance to adapt our plans so that our guests are not simply “passengers” but become active participants in their trip.

Sea Kayaking

Experience Antarctica from the unique vantage point of a sea kayak. The majestic landscape, the icebergs, and the wildlife look different as you paddle quietly through the icy waters.

The Program

The sea kayaking program is an optional small-group experience limited to a maximum of 10 participants. The group enjoys multiple excursions throughout the voyage under the guidance and leadership of an experienced Kayak Master.

Every day in Antarctica, the Falklands (Malvinas), and South Georgia, and Southern Patagonia, your Kayak Master will work with the Expedition Team to look for the best kayaking opportunities based on suitable and safe weather conditions. A dedicated safety Zodiac will support the group. Each kayaking excursion will be approximately one and a half hours. The Kayak Master will strive to offer some time at the landing site so you can also explore on land.

To take part in the kayaking program, you must have previous experience and know how to swim. The minimum age for participation is 16 years, and space is limited. We recommend booking the Sea Kayaking program upon reservation of your expedition.

The Hiking & Snowshoeing program is an optional small-group experience offered on board the ship as a one-off excursion. A Hiking and Snowshoeing Guide leads the group.

Every day you are in Antarctica, the Hiking and Snowshoeing Guide will work with the Expedition Leader to look for the best hiking or snowshoeing opportunities within the trip's schedule, based on suitable and safe weather conditions. Each excursion will be approximately one and a half hours in

duration. Depending on the conditions of the terrain, some excursions may require the use of snowshoes and/or trekking poles, that Antarctica21 provides. Participants can select the excursions they want to join, paying a per-excursion fee. The activity can be booked and paid for on board the ship.

To take part in the Hiking & Snowshoeing program, you do not need previous experience. However, your level of physical fitness should be good. The minimum age for participation is 12 years.

Antarctica21 is a small, independent, Chilean-owned, and managed company. When you travel with Antarctica21, you support specialized, small-scale tourism in Chile. Your travel investment with Antarctica21 creates employment in Chile and directly benefits the developing Chilean economy.

Our team is made up of specialized and passionate individuals who care deeply about Antarctica and the Southern Ocean. We handcraft each experience with love, working as a family and welcoming our expedition guests into that family.

Our team ensures that every Antarctica21 expedition is carried out in a sustainable, responsible way, according to the stringent requirements of the Antarctic Treaty and the rigorous guidelines of the International Association of Antarctica Tour Operators (IAATO), of which Antarctica21 is a full and active member.

Our Expedition Team will lead you on an inspiring and satisfying adventure while maintaining the integrity of Antarctica's environment and wildlife species.



RESPONSIBLE TRAVELER GUIDELINES

- Never disturb or feed wildlife on land or at sea, allow wildlife to instigate all interactions.
- Don't take souvenirs (for example rocks, feathers, bones, etc.)
- Don't leave anything behind. Take home everything you brought with you.
- Never walk on moss and lichens. It takes years to grow back.
- When ashore, keep at least 5 meters (15 feet) distance from all animals.
- While kayaking, keep at least 100 meters (328 feet) distance from whales and seals.
- Avoid blocking the "walkways" between penguin colonies and their water entry and exit points.
- Use the provided facilities to decontaminate your boots and help protect the ecosystem from foreign bacteria or seeds.



RESPONSIBLE PHOTOGRAPHY GUIDELINES

Always respect animals when taking pictures. Your shot is important, but the wellbeing of wildlife must always take priority.

- Flash photography is not allowed; it might spook the animals.
- Read about Antarctic wildlife species and learn to read their behavior.
- If an animal appears distressed, stop taking photos and move away slowly and immediately.

Commitment to Sustainability

Claudio Bobadilla, Head of Antarctica21's Department of Energy Efficiency and Sustainability, touches on some of the company's innovative programs and operations.

Ships and planes use a lot of energy. How do you manage this aspect of your operation?

We currently operate two expedition ships and a fleet of small jets. This complex operation does use a lot of energy. However, we take all possible measures to reduce our impact. To that end, we work on two main fronts: energy efficiency and offsetting our emissions.

How can the company improve the energy efficiency of its operation?

Firstly, by implementing good management processes that are based on data and analysis. To achieve that objective, my department works with several stakeholders on operational protocols that are designed to optimize and minimize fuel usage. Secondly, by implementing modern technology that is as energy efficient as possible. For example, Magellan Explorer is outfitted with a heat recovery system: the heat produced by the main engines and generators is captured and recycled for the heating of the ship and its water supply. All of this allows us to avoid waste and limit energy use.

What is the role of offsetting emissions in the management of Antarctica21?

Although there is a lot of research and investment in this field, today, there are no alternatives to fossil fuels for our type of operation. However, there are compensation programs that represent a way for a company like ours to reach neutrality. We are a CarbonNeutral® certified company. By purchasing carbon credits, we offset the emissions of our travel operation and the entire operation of our offices, business trips, etc.

What is the benefit of the CarbonNeutral® certification for Antarctica21?

Our purchase of carbon credits supports the production of renewable energy. Aside from that, undergoing the certification process is like doing an X-ray of the business. It's an extremely useful process that helps understand operational processes and identify areas where improvements are possible. Also, the certification is like the company's environmental passport, a symbol of the process we have undergone and of our commitment to sustainability. But while we offset our emissions today, ultimately, our goal is to reach zero emissions, not just to compensate.

How can that goal be achieved?

For that to be achieved, we need propulsion systems that don't emit greenhouse gases. We're in a moment of transition now. With the support of governments and academic institutions, the maritime and aviation industries are developing solutions for the future. We look forward to implementing those new technologies as soon as they become available. In the meantime, synthetic fuels that are made with green energy and use CO₂ captured from the atmosphere may represent an interim step.

Can you give us an example of the concrete actions Antarctica21 is taking to limit its footprint?

One of the practical steps we have taken is installing a state-of-the-art energy monitoring solution on Magellan Explorer. The software, provided by the Icelandic company Marorka, allows us to measure and analyze, minute by minute, all the energy the ship uses, including the fuel consumption of the two main engines, the three generators, and the boiler. With that, we can ensure that each engine is operated at its point of maximum efficiency, optimizing fuel usage and reducing emissions.

With A21CONNECT, opportunities for understanding and gaining knowledge are woven throughout your journey, with multiple touchpoints.

Our expedition team offers engaging presentations on board the ship and interpretation in the field. Additionally, there are several one-on-one moments throughout your journey, where conversations with team members build upon the experiences of the day, leading to contextualized



understanding. Thanks to the small-scale of our operation, those moments happen frequently: in the lounge, in the dining room, on deck, during a Zodiac cruise, and on countless other opportunities. Finally, we offer interactive workshops where you can participate and learn: open discussions, photography workshops, citizen science programs that collect data in support of scientists around the world, and more.

Through A21CONNECT, Antarctica, a distant and mysterious region, is revealed in action.

PLANNING YOUR TRIP



Arrival & Departure Details



Review the important details below about arrival and departure for your expedition, and make your travel plans accordingly. Ask your booking agent for assistance as needed.

Patagonia & Chilean Fjords

The “Patagonia & Chilean Fjords” itinerary is operated north to south, and south to north, depending on the departure date. Ensure that you are clear on the embarkation and disembarkation ports of your departure. The expedition starts at the pier as indicated in the itinerary. Boarding opens at 15:00 hrs. and closes at 16:00 hrs. On the last day of the expedition, disembarkation is planned for the morning as indicated in the itinerary, with the trip ending at the pier.

Falklands (Malvinas) & South Georgia

For “The Falklands & South Georgia” itinerary, on Day 1 in Punta Arenas, from 9:00 hrs., make your way to Explorers House and enjoy the facilities. At 16:00 hrs., a transfer to the ship will be provided. Upon arrival at Punta Arenas, on the last day of the expedition, we disembark and take a group transfer to the town’s center where the expedition will end. Explorers House remains available to you for the day.

Falklands (Malvinas), South Georgia, & Antarctica

For the “Falklands (Malvinas), South Georgia & Antarctica” itinerary, on Day 1 in Punta Arenas, from 9:00 hrs., make your way to Explorers House and enjoy the facilities. At 16:00 hrs., a transfer to the ship will be provided. On the last day of the expedition, disembarkation in Ushuaia is planned in the morning. However, delays are possible. Antarctica21 strongly suggests that any travel plans made for the last day of the expedition do not start until the late afternoon.

Antarctic Small Ship Expedition

The “Antarctic Small Ship Expedition” itinerary starts at the pier in Ushuaia, and boarding is between 15:00 hrs. and 16:00 hrs. At 16:00 hrs. boarding will close. On the last day of the expedition, disembarkation in Ushuaia is planned in the morning. However, delays are possible. Antarctica21 strongly suggests that any travel plans made for the last day of the expedition do not start until the late afternoon.

Traveling to and from your Antarctic gateway

Flights between Ushuaia and Buenos Aires’ Ezeiza international airport and Aeroparque domestic airport are available daily on a few airlines. Buenos Aires can easily be accessed with many international flights that land daily at Ezeiza international airport.

Many international airlines land daily at Santiago’s Arturo Merino Benitez airport. Several airlines offer daily service between Santiago and Punta Arenas.

Overland transportation by bus between Ushuaia and Punta Arenas, a 12-hour journey, is also available.

Hotel & Transfer Package

For sea voyages that start and end in Punta Arenas, we offer a convenient Hotel & Transfer Package.

The package is available pre-expedition and post-expedition and includes:

- Welcome service at the airport
- Dedicated group airport transfers

Packing For Your Trip

Suggested Clothing

The average temperature in the Falkland Islands (Islas Malvinas) during the time of our visit is in the 5 – 10°C (40 – 50 °F) range. The average temperature in South Georgia and the Antarctic Peninsula area during the time of our visit is about 0°C (32°F), although sometimes it may feel a little lower because of the wind chill factor. For this reason, it is best to wear several layers of light, warm clothing. The suggested clothing for Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic regions is very similar to that recommended for skiing: thermal underwear, a couple of warm and wicking mid-layers, a windproof and waterproof jacket, plus pants as the outer layer. You will also need a hat, a scarf, waterproof and insulated gloves, and sunglasses with high UV protection. The pre-departure material provides further details. We also suggest packing comfortable clothes to wear on board, as well as rubber-soled shoes for walking around on the outside decks.

Useful Tips

Waterproof Boots

As most landings in Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic regions are “wet landings,” the best footwear is knee-high waterproof boots. You will not need to carry them with you since Antarctica21 will provide you with a pair of thermal rubber boots.

Face Protection

Good quality UV filtering sunglasses are essential. Glacier glasses have leather flaps at the sides to stop the light from passing through. Due to the high reflectance of UV radiation, you will also need good sunblock lotion for your face (protection factor 30 and above) and lip balm.

Photography

To see the wildlife, you should have a good pair of lightweight binoculars (the suggested magnification is 7× or 8×). If you are passionate about photography, do not forget a good zoom lens to shoot wildlife while avoiding close approaches. Also, take a good supply of memory cards and spare batteries with you since cold temperatures can reduce their life span. The recreational use of drones is not allowed during the expedition.

Visa Requirements

All Travelers should check the entry requirements of the countries visited during their trip, based on their nationality. For trips that visit Argentina, Chile, and the UK, the requirements of these countries should be considered. Please note that a multiple entry visa is required for our trips.

Dietary Information

Requests regarding diets must be made on the Participation Form you receive after your booking confirmation. This information will be passed along to our staff so they can accommodate your needs while on your voyage. Note: due to the nature of our expeditions and the kitchens onboard the ships, Kosher and vegan meals cannot be accommodated.

Our expeditions are suitable for adventurous travelers who enjoy full mobility and reasonably good health. Expedition travel to Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic regions requires flexibility and adaptation to ever-changing circumstances.

Your Travel Companions

Antarctica21 offers its expeditions worldwide. Each year we welcome travelers from over 40 different countries. They may travel alone, as a family, or as part of a group. While some of your traveling companions may speak different languages and have different customs, they will share your passion for adventure and interest in the natural world.

Participation Form

Participants are required to fill out and sign an online Participation Form and return it to Antarctica21 at least 120 days prior to departure. Based on the medical information provided in the form, Antarctica21's Medical Director may request a medical certificate. All participants 75 years of age and older must submit a medical certificate.

Medical Insurance

Antarctica21 requires participants to be adequately covered by a travel insurance policy that covers aero-medical evacuation from any of your destinations in the case of a medical emergency during the trips, including emergencies related to pre-existing health conditions.

Cancellation Insurance

Antarctica21 strongly urges participants to be adequately covered by trip cancellation and interruption insurance.

Itinerary

Every effort will be made to adhere to the planned program. However, with this type of adventurous travel, changes to the itinerary may occur due to severe and changeable weather. We need to emphasize the fact that weather conditions are unpredictable, and safety is always the paramount concern on any Antarctic voyage. For this reason, Antarctica21 reserves the right to change the itinerary described due to weather conditions or other factors beyond Antarctica21's control without consulting the participants.



Baggage and Baggage Allowance

We recommend that clients avoid expensive designer luggage that is easily damaged. We also strongly recommend that clients take out a luggage insurance policy that covers the cost of repairs or replacement in case their luggage is damaged. Due to the nature of the expedition, and as stated in our Terms and Conditions of Sale, Antarctica21 cannot be responsible for any damage to a customer's luggage.

Note that at certain points during the expedition you will be required to handle your own luggage.

Expedition Language

The official language of our expeditions is English. The voyage will take travelers to remote destinations where interaction with our polar guides is essential. In the interest of safety and for the enjoyment of the experience, we strongly recommend that travelers who do not understand English be accompanied by someone who does, such as a friend, a family member, or a Tour Leader.



Itinerary

Day 1 / Puerto Montt, Embarkation

Your journey begins in Puerto Montt, Chile, with boarding between 15:00 and 16:00 hrs. After all mandatory briefings, the ship sets sail towards the Gulf of Corcovado.

Day 2 / Puyuhuapi Channel

We continue south to visit the area around Puerto Aysen and Puyuhuapi in the Aysén region. As we cruise and explore the area, we see the landscape unfold with its many fjords, islands, and channels. We hope to visit either Puerto Cisnes, Puyuhuapi, or Magdalena Island, with the possibility to see dolphins, whales, cormorants, sea lions, and river otters.

Day 3 / San Rafael National Park

Today, the ship reaches the Chonos Archipelago. Heading towards the Moraleda Channel, the vessel cruises around the area of San Rafael National Park, a biosphere reserve, if weather permits. The park is the main entry point to Chile's Northern Patagonian Ice Field. We will also explore the surrounding fjords, channels, islands, and coves.

Day 4 / Day at Sea, Gulf of Penas

As we sail south, we cross the Gulf of Penas, enjoying beautiful views of the surrounding mountain ranges. The expedition team tells us about the indigenous inhabitants of these southern lands, the early Spanish colonizers, and famous explorers such as Charles Darwin, Fitz Roy, and Alberto de Agostini. We also learn about the region's biodiversity through presentations about the local marine fauna and flora.

Day 5 / Caleta Tortel and Messier Channel

If weather permits, a visit to Caleta Tortel or the surrounding region is planned for the morning. Located between the mouth of the Baker River and a small cove within the Baker Channel, Caleta Tortel is a small village consisting mainly of stilt houses, typical of Chilotan architecture, built along the coast for several kilometers. Wooden walkways are built with Guaitecas cypress, they connect houses and give the village its distinctive look and unique culture. We continue sailing south towards Messier Channel

and navigate through the dramatic 18-meter-wide (59 feet) English Narrows for a privileged view of the glaciers of the Southern Patagonian Ice Field. Outside Antarctica, some of the largest glaciers in the southern hemisphere are found here.

Day 6 / Bernardo O'Higgins National Park

We embark on a Zodiac excursion to the Amalia Glacier area or the surrounding glaciers along the Peel Fjord in the Bernardo O'Higgins National Park. We bask in the glacier's icy-blue beauty and cruise across the sea and among its ice floes to uncover part of Chile's natural mystique. As we sail between snow-capped peaks to get a closer look at the glacier and its brilliant and rugged textures, we may spot dolphins swimming at a distance, cormorants or condors flying above, and otters.

Day 7 / Day at Sea, Strait of Magellan and Tierra del Fuego

While heading south along the Strait of Magellan, we explore the waters of the fjords that branch out from Tierra del Fuego. We follow the remote coast around the Francisco Coloane Marine Park, a protected area in the southern hemisphere where whales feed. If we are lucky, we may be able to spot humpback or sei whales breaching in the distance. We may also see dolphins, sea lions, seals, penguins, albatrosses, and petrels.

Day 8 / Beagle Channel & Garibaldi Fjord

The Beagle Channel is a striking narrow passage in the archipelago of Tierra del Fuego, a region originally named after the fires that burned in local native settlements when the first European explorers arrived. Dividing Chile and Argentina, the passage showcases ice formations along the snow-dusted Darwin Range. We will sail along Glacier Alley, home to the Holanda, Italia, Francia, Alemania, and Romanche glaciers, aiming to explore the Garibaldi Fjord.

Day 9 / Ushuaia Argentina, Disembarkation

Morning arrival in Ushuaia and disembarkation.

Itinerary

Day 1 / Punta Arenas, Embarkation

From 9:00 hrs., make your way to Explorers House in Punta Arenas and enjoy the facilities. At 16:00 hrs., a group transfer will take you to the port for embarkation. As we sail along the Strait of Magellan, our Expedition Team will introduce the history of this fabled sea route.

Day 2 / At Sea

Enjoy the ship's hospitality as we make our way to the Falklands (Malvinas). Our engaging series of lectures and presentations begins.

Day 3 / Saunders Island, Carcass Island

We enjoy the long white-sand beach during a morning visit to Saunders Island. A wilderness experience, the main attractions are rockhopper penguins, nesting black-browed albatross, and sub-Antarctic gentoo penguins. In the afternoon, we visit Carcass Island. There is an option for an easy hike to the settlement, bird watching, and a typical Falklands tea experience.

Day 4 / Port Stanley

Join our expedition team on guided walking tours of Port Stanley or Gipsy Cove. Or explore on your own and absorb the atmosphere, grabbing lunch at the local pub, visiting the maritime museum, the church, hunting for souvenirs, or walking down Ross Road, paying tribute at the war memorials at the waterfront.

Day 5-6 / At Sea

As we sail towards South Georgia, attend presentations on the history and fauna of the archipelago. In the company of expert guides, watch for wildlife from the lounge or from the outside decks. You may spot magnificent seabirds, such as albatrosses and petrels, as well as different species of whales.

Day 7 / Elsehul Bay

Depending on sea conditions over the previous days, arrival is planned for the afternoon. Provided we receive approval from the South Georgia government, we plan to do an evening Zodiac cruise at Elsehul Bay.

Day 8 / Grytviken, Fortuna Bay

Our first landing is at Grytviken. We clear Customs and then visit the historical site with the museum and Ernest

Shackleton's grave. We land at Fortuna Bay / Stromness in the afternoon to see king penguins. Here, we learn more about Shackleton and his expedition, and there is also an optional 2-3 hour "Shackleton walk."

Day 9 / Gold Harbour, Cooper Bay

In the morning, we plan a landing at Gold Harbour, a spectacular location with king penguins, elephant seals, and hanging glaciers. There are also sooty albatrosses here. In the afternoon and on a Zodiac cruise, we visit Cooper Bay to see macaroni penguins.

Day 10 / St Andrews Bay, Ocean Harbour

St Andrews Bay is the destination of our morning excursion. The highlights here are a shipwreck and the remains of the whaling industry. We see the largest king penguin colony and elephant seal bulls. We plan a Zodiac cruise in the afternoon and landing at Ocean Harbour.

Day 11 / Prion Island, Salisbury Plain

Depending on weather conditions, we plan to visit Prion Island to see the nesting wandering albatross or head to Salisbury Plain to observe more king penguins and stunning landscapes.

Day 12-14 / At Sea

Our education program continues as we make our way back to the Falkland Islands (Islas Malvinas).

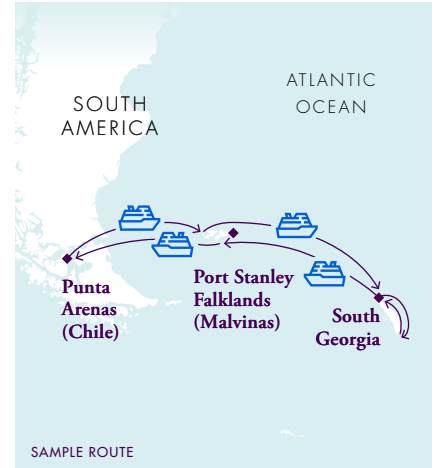

Morning visit to St. Andrews Bay. We'll see the largest king penguin colony and elephant seal bulls. In the afternoon, visit Cooper Bay to encounter macaroni penguins on a Zodiac cruise.

Day 11-12 / At sea

Day 13 / Elephant Island

In the afternoon, we will see Elephant Island. While a landing here is unlikely, we will see the island from the ship or, if sea conditions allow, from a Zodiac.

Day 2-3 / Crossing the Drake Passage

As you sail en route to the South Shetland Islands, attend an engaging program of lectures and presentations. In the company of expert guides, watch for wildlife from the glass-enclosed lounge or the outside decks. You may spot magnificent sea birds, such as albatrosses and petrels, as well as different species of whales on their way south to Antarctica. After crossing the Antarctic Convergence, the environment changes noticeably. Keep your camera ready, as this is the time to watch for the first icebergs and the sight of Antarctic land.

Day 4-7 / Exploring Antarctica

Cruise between the South Shetland Islands and the western coast of the Antarctic Peninsula, sailing along ice-filled fjords and among spectacular icebergs while enjoying the company of sea birds, penguins, seals, and whales. Each day, disembark by Zodiac boat and explore the landscape together with expert polar guides. Enjoy spectacular vistas from the glass-enclosed lounge of the ship while sharing your daily adventures with fellow guests.

No journey is the same, as flexibility is the key to success in Antarctica. The Expedition Team sets the voyage route to take advantage of the ever-changing opportunities provided by nature, crafting a unique and extraordinary experience each time. While the exact itinerary changes with each expedition, you will explore several locations that offer the best possible overview of the varied Antarctic environment. Your voyage may include visits to sites such as Paulet Island, Hope Bay, Port Lockroy, Petermann Island, Paradise Bay, Deception Island, the Lemaire Channel,

Magellan Explorer has seven categories of accommodation, including dedicated single cabins. All cabins except Porthole Cabins feature private balconies. All double cabins, except four, have two twin beds that can be configured as one king-size bed. All cabins feature a wardrobe, an individually controlled heating system, a sitting area, and a private bathroom with a shower.

The ship features a glass-enclosed observation lounge and presentation room with state-of-the-art audio-visual equipment, a spacious and stylish dining room, a well-stocked bar, a library, a meeting room, a gym, a sauna, and a medical clinic. The forward-facing observation deck leads to the ship's bow, which is accessible to guests to offer proximity to marine wildlife. The ship has a fleet of 10 Zodiacs that are well suited for disembarking and wildlife watching.

Deposit

An initial deposit of \$4,000 USD per person is required to book a cabin, except for Patagonia & Chilean Fjords and Antarctic Small Ship Expeditions, where the deposit is \$1,500 USD per person.

The balance is due in full 120 days prior to departure. Payments can be made by wire transfer or credit card via PayPal, and more payment options are available via WeTravel. Wire transfer costs are to be borne by the sender. Credit card payments via PayPal are subject to a 2.7% fee (however, the 2.7% fee is not charged on the deposit). Payments received after the due date are subject to a \$250 USD per person late payment fee.

Children

Children are admitted from the age of 12 years if accompanied by an adult who will take responsibility and sign a waiver.

Single Travelers

Single travelers can choose between:

- Booking a dedicated Single Cabin: no supplement is applied for single use of dedicated Single Cabins.
- Booking a Twin Cabin for single use: an 85% supplement will be added to the rate per person when booking a limited number of Porthole and Veranda Cabins on Magellan Explorer and Twin Cabins on Ocean Nova. A 100% supplement applies when booking all other categories.

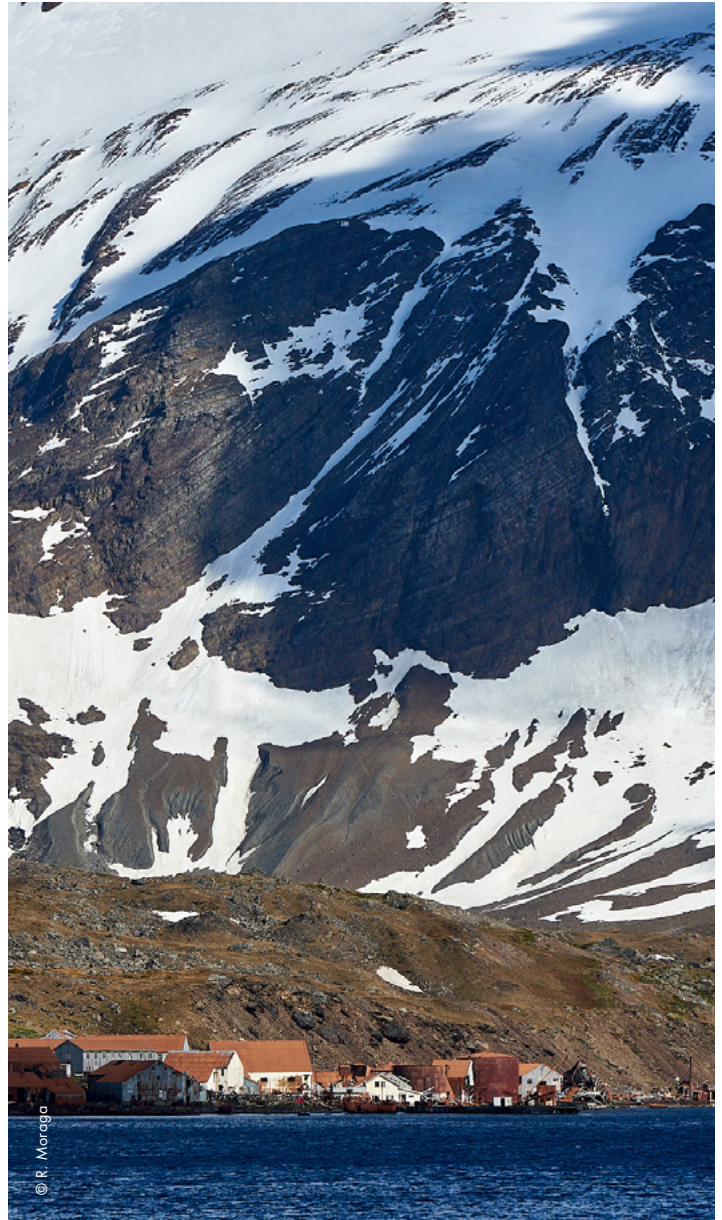

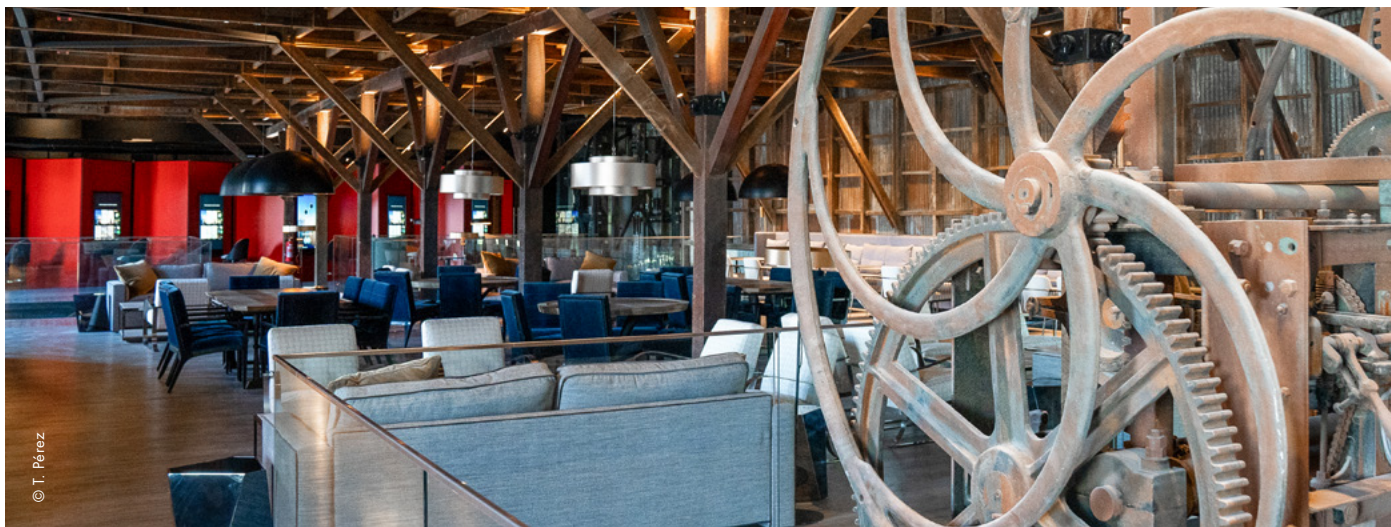

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A Glimpse into Expedition Cruising

Nicolás Gildemeister, Director of Operation, Expedition and Product Department, shares four key aspects of Antarctica21's expedition cruising experience.

What makes expedition cruising a unique way of traveling?

Unlike traditional cruises focused on entertainment, expedition cruising is about adventure and education, generally to remote and challenging destinations. We have a clear objective – to create an intimate experience that connects our guests with each destination. These trips require smaller, specifically designed vessels with a unique balance of crew expertise and guest capacity. Antarctica21 offers boutique comfort and adaptability, coupled with a team of polar experts with specialized knowledge, setting it apart from conventional cruises.

Why is the experience on smaller ships crucial to the Antarctic journey?

The size of the ship is key. Smaller vessels offer greater flexibility and personalization,

facilitating quick transfers, boardings, and disembarkations. Low passenger capacity and high guide-to-guest ratio enable spontaneous itinerary adjustments and unique wildlife encounters, ensuring a dynamic and tailored voyage that larger ships cannot match. If we know a pod of whales is nearby, we can change our route, adjusting our plans with ease. The Antarctic Treaty limits the number of guests ashore to a maximum of 100. Larger ships must therefore organize shore visits in groups, with guests taking turns. On the other hand, all guests on Antarctica21's small ships can disembark at once, maximizing their time ashore. There are other differences. For example, during meals, our polar experts sit with guests for one-on-one conversations, creating meaningful connections and delving deeper into any topic of interest.

How does Antarctica21 adapt its itineraries in response to the unpredictable Antarctic conditions while ensuring rich exploration opportunities?

Antarctica's ever-changing weather and challenging conditions require a flexible approach to itinerary planning. You cannot fight nature. Instead, you need to adapt with creativity. We have been organizing fly and cruise expeditions in Antarctica for more than 20 years, and we have extensive experience in navigating these changes, adapting plans swiftly and strategically, much like a game of chess. This adaptive strategy allows for a fulfilling exploration experience, prioritizing flexibility and the opportunity to witness the unique wonders of Antarctica up close.

How would you describe the guests' expedition experience?

At the heart of Antarctica21's expeditions lies the creation of a small community of explorers. We invite travelers not only to observe but to be active participants in this journey, adding their own chapter to the story of exploration. Sea Kayaking

Experience Antarctica and the Chilean Patagonia from the unique vantage point of a sea kayak. The majestic landscape, the icebergs, and the wildlife presents a unique perspective as you paddle quietly through the icy waters.

The Program

The sea kayaking program is an optional small-group experience limited to a maximum of 20 participants per expedition who will go on excursions in two separate groups of 10 guests each, on an alternating basis. Each group of 10 guests enjoy 1-2 excursions throughout the voyage under the guidance and leadership of an experienced Kayak Master.

During your trip in Antarctica and Southern Patagonia, your Kayak Master will work with the Expedition Team to look for the best kayaking opportunities based on suitable and safe weather conditions. A dedicated safety Zodiac will support the group. Each kayaking excursion will be approximately one and a half hours. The Kayak Master will strive to offer some time at the landing site so you can also explore on land.

To take part in the kayaking program, you must have previous experience, know how to swim, and be able to communicate in English. The minimum age for participation is 15 years, and space is limited. We recommend booking the Sea Kayaking program upon reservation of your expedition.

The Program

The Hiking & Snowshoeing program is an optional small-group experience offered on board the ship as a one-off excursion. A Hiking & Snowshoeing Guide leads the group.

During your trip in Antarctica, the Hiking & Snowshoeing Guide will work with the Expedition Leader to look for the best hiking or snowshoeing opportunities within the trip's schedule, based on suitable and safe weather conditions. Each excursion will be approximately one and a half hours in duration. Depending on the time of the year and the conditions of the terrain, some excursions may require the use of snowshoes and/or trekking poles, which Antarctica21 provides. November, December, and January, generally offer good snowshoeing opportunities. Snowshoes are usually not needed in February and March. Participants can select the excursions they want to join, paying a per-excursion fee. The activity can be booked and paid on board the ship.

To take part in the Hiking & Snowshoeing program, you do not need previous experience. However, your level of physical fitness should be good. The minimum age for participation is 15 years.

RESPONSIBLE TRAVELER GUIDELINES

- There are no bathrooms available at landings in Antarctica. Make sure to use the facilities on board before excursions.
- Never disturb or feed wildlife on land or at sea, allow wildlife to instigate all interactions.
- Don't take souvenirs (for example rocks, feathers, bones, etc.)
- Don't leave anything behind. Take home everything you brought with you.
- Never walk on moss and lichens. It takes years to grow back.
- When ashore, keep at least 5 meters (15 feet) distance from all animals.
- While kayaking, keep at least 100 meters (328 feet) distance from whales and seals.
- Avoid blocking the 'walkways' between penguin colonies and their water entry and exit points.
- Use the provided facilities to decontaminate your boots and help protect the ecosystem from foreign bacteria or seeds.



RESPONSIBLE PHOTOGRAPHY GUIDELINES

Always respect animals when taking pictures. Your shot is important, but the wellbeing of wildlife must always take priority.

- Flash photography is not allowed; it might spook the animals.
- Read about Antarctic wildlife species and learn to read their behavior.
- If an animal appears distressed, stop taking photos and move away slowly and immediately.

PLANNING YOUR TRIP



Arrival & Departure Details

Review the important details below about arrival and departure for your sea voyage, and make your travel plans accordingly. Ask your booking agent for assistance as needed.

Patagonia & Chilean Fjords

The "Patagonia & Chilean Fjords" itinerary is operated north to south, and south to north, depending on the departure date. Ensure that you are clear on the embarkation and disembarkation ports of your departure. The expedition starts at the pier as indicated in the itinerary. Boarding opens at 15:00 hrs. and closes at 16:00 hrs. On the last day of the expedition, disembarkation is planned for the morning as indicated in the itinerary, with the trip ending at the pier.

Falklands (Malvinas) & South Georgia

For "The Falklands & South Georgia" itinerary, on Day 1 in Punta Arenas, from 9:00 hrs., make your way to Explorers House and enjoy the facilities. At 16:00 hrs., a transfer to the ship will be provided. Upon arrival at Punta Arenas, on the last day of the expedition, we disembark and take a group transfer to the town's center where the expedition will end. Explorers House remains available to you for the day.

Falklands (Malvinas), South Georgia & Antarctica

For the "Falklands (Malvinas), South Georgia & Antarctica" itinerary, on Day 1 in Punta Arenas, from 9:00 hrs., make your way to Explorers House and enjoy the facilities. At 16:00 hrs., a transfer to the ship will be provided. On the last day of the expedition, disembarkation in Ushuaia is planned in the morning. However, delays are possible. Antarctica21 strongly suggests that any travel plans made for the last day of the expedition do not start until the late afternoon.

Antarctic Small Ship Expedition

The "Antarctic Small Ship Expedition" itinerary starts at the pier in Ushuaia, and boarding is between 15:00 hrs. and 16:00 hrs. At 16:00 hrs. boarding will close. On the last day of the expedition, disembarkation in Ushuaia is planned in the morning. However, delays are possible. Antarctica21 strongly suggests that any travel plans made for the last day of the expedition do not start until the late afternoon.

Traveling to and from your Antarctic gateway

Flights between Ushuaia and Buenos Aires' Ezeiza International Airport and Aeroparque Domestic Airport are available daily on a few airlines. Buenos Aires can easily be accessed with many international flights that land daily at Ezeiza International Airport.

Many international airlines land daily at Santiago's Arturo Merino Benitez International Airport. Several airlines offer daily service between Santiago and Punta Arenas.

Overland transportation by bus between Ushuaia and Punta Arenas, a 12-hour journey, is also available.

Packing For Your Trip

Suggested Clothing

The average temperature in the Falkland Islands (Islas Malvinas) during the time of our visit is in the 5 - 10°C (40 – 50 °F) range. The average temperature in South Georgia and the Antarctic Peninsula area during the time of our visit is about 0°C (32°F), although sometimes it may feel a little lower because of the wind chill factor. For this reason, it is best to wear several layers of light, warm clothing. The suggested clothing for Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic regions is very similar to that recommended for skiing: thermal underwear, a couple of warm and wicking mid-layers, a windproof and waterproof jacket, plus pants as the outer layer. You will also need a hat, a scarf, waterproof and insulated gloves, and sunglasses with high UV protection. The pre-departure material provides further details. We also suggest packing comfortable clothes to wear on board, as well as rubber-soled shoes for walking around on the outside decks.

Useful Tips

Waterproof Boots & Clothing

As most landings in Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic regions are "wet landings," the best footwear is knee-high waterproof boots. You will not need to carry them with you since Antarctica21 will provide you with a pair of thermal rubber boots.

We highly recommend that you pack waterproof outer layers to keep dry during Zodiac excursions and landings.

Face Protection

Good quality UV filtering sunglasses are essential. Glacier glasses have leather flaps at the sides to stop the light from passing through. Due to the high reflectance of UV radiation, you will also need good sunblock lotion for your face (protection factor 30 and above) and lip balm.

Photography

To see the wildlife, you should have a good pair of lightweight binoculars (the suggested magnification is 7x or 8x). If you are passionate about photography, do not forget a good zoom lens to shoot wildlife while avoiding close approaches. Also, take a good supply of memory cards and spare batteries with you since cold temperatures can reduce their life span. The recreational use of drones is not allowed during the expedition.

Visa Requirements

All travelers should check the entry requirements of the countries visited during their trip, based on their nationality. For trips that visit Argentina, Chile, and the UK, the requirements of these countries should be considered. Please note that a multiple-entry visa is required for our trips.

Dietary Information

Requests regarding diets must be made on the Participation Form you receive after your booking confirmation. This information will be passed along to our staff so they can accommodate your needs while on your voyage.

While some of your traveling companions may speak different languages and have different customs, they will share your passion for adventure and interest in the natural world.

Participation Form

Participants are required to fill out and sign an online Participation Form and return it to Antarctica21 at least 90 days prior to departure.

Medical Insurance

It is mandatory that participants to be adequately covered by a travel insurance policy that covers aero-medical evacuation from any of the destinations included in your selected itinerary in the case of a medical emergency during the trips, including emergencies related to pre-existing health conditions.

Cancellation Insurance

Antarctica21 strongly urges participants to be adequately covered by trip cancellation and interruption insurance.

Itinerary

Every effort will be made to adhere to the planned program. However, with this type of adventurous travel, changes to the itinerary may occur due to severe and changeable weather. We need to emphasize the fact that weather conditions are unpredictable, and safety is always the paramount concern on any Antarctic voyage. For this reason, Antarctica21 reserves the right to change the itinerary described due to weather conditions or other factors beyond Antarctica21's control without consulting the participants.

Baggage

We recommend that clients avoid expensive designer luggage that is easily damaged. We also strongly recommend that clients take out a luggage insurance policy that covers the cost of repairs or replacement in case their luggage is damaged. Due to the nature of the expedition, and as stated in our Terms and Conditions of Sale, Antarctica21 cannot be responsible for any damage to a customer's luggage.

Note that at certain points during the expedition, you will be required to handle your own luggage.

Expedition Language

The official language of our expeditions is English. The voyage will take travelers to remote destinations where interaction with our polar guides is essential. In the interest of safety and for the enjoyment of the experience, we strongly recommend that travelers who do not understand English be accompanied by someone who does, such as a friend, a family member, or a Tour Leader.

Itinerary

Day 1 / Puerto Montt, Embarkation

Your journey begins in Puerto Montt, Chile, with boarding at the port between 15:00 and 16:00 hrs. After all mandatory briefings, the ship sets sail towards the Gulf of Corcovado.

Day 2 / Puyuhuapi Channel

We continue south to visit the area around Puerto Aysén and Puyuhuapi in the Aysén region. As we cruise and explore the area, we see the landscape unfold with its many fjords, islands, and channels. We hope to visit either Puerto Cisnes, Puyuhuapi, or Magdalena Island, with the possibility to see dolphins, whales, cormorants, sea lions, and river otters.

Day 3 / Moraleda Channel

The voyage continues with an expedition day in the Chonos Archipelago. Aiming towards the Moraleda Channel, we cruise around the area of San Rafael National Park, a Biosphere Reserve, if the weather allows. The park is the main entry point to Chile's Northern Icefields. Enjoy exploring the surrounding fjords, channels, islands, and coves.

Day 4 / Gulf of Penas & Caleta Tortel

As we sail south, we cross the Gulf of Penas, enjoying beautiful views of the surrounding mountain ranges. The expedition team tells us about the indigenous inhabitants of these southern lands, the early Spanish colonizers, and famous explorers such as Charles Darwin, Fitz Roy, and Alberto de Agostini. We also learn about the region's biodiversity through presentations about the local marine fauna and flora. If weather permits, a visit to Caleta Tortel or the surrounding region is planned for the afternoon. Located between the mouth of the Baker River and a small cove within the Baker Channel, Caleta Tortel is a small village consisting mainly of stilt houses, typical of Chilotan architecture, built along the coast for several kilometers. Wooden walkways are built with Guaitecas cypress; they connect houses and give the village its distinctive look and unique culture.

Day 5 / Messier Channel & Pio XI Glacier

We continue sailing south towards Messier Channel and navigate through the dramatic 18-meter-wide (59

feet) English Narrows for a privileged view of the glaciers of the Southern Patagonian Ice Field. In the afternoon we aim to visit Pío XI Glacier or another nearby glacier. Brüggen Glacier, also known as Pío XI Glacier named by Spanish explorers after a Pope, is the largest western outflow from the Southern Patagonian Ice Field. It is also the longest glacier in the southern hemisphere outside Antarctica.

Day 6 / Bernardo O'Higgins National Park

We embark on a Zodiac excursion to the El Brujo or Amalia Glacier or the surrounding glaciers along the Peel Fjord in the Bernardo O'Higgins National Park. We bask in the glacier's icy-blue beauty and cruise across the sea and among its ice floes to uncover part of Chile's natural mystique. As we sail between snow-capped peaks to get a closer look at the glacier and its brilliant and rugged textures, we may spot dolphins swimming at a distance, cormorants or condors flying above, and otters.

Day 7 / Day at Sea, Strait of Magellan and Tierra del Fuego

While heading south along the Strait of Magellan, we explore the waters of the fjords that branch out from Tierra del Fuego. We follow the remote coast around the Francisco Coloane Marine Park, a protected area in the southern hemisphere where whales feed. If we are lucky, we may be able to spot humpback or sei whales breaching in the distance. We may also see dolphins, sea lions, seals, penguins, albatrosses, and petrels.

Day 8 / Beagle Channel & Garibaldi Fjord

The Beagle Channel is a striking narrow passage in the archipelago of Tierra del Fuego, a region originally named after the fires that burned in local native settlements when the first European explorers arrived. Dividing Chile and Argentina, the passage showcases ice formations along the snow-dusted Darwin Range. We will sail along Glacier Alley, home to the Holanda, Italia, Francia, Alemania, and Romanche glaciers, aiming to explore the Garibaldi Fjord.

Day 9 / Ushuaia Argentina, Disembarkation

Morning arrival in Ushuaia and disembarkation.

Itinerary

Day 1 / Punta Arenas, Embarkation

From 10:00 hrs, make your way to Explorers House in Punta Arenas and enjoy the facilities. At 15:00 hrs, a group transfer will take you to the port for embarkation. As we sail along the Strait of Magellan, our Expedition Team will introduce the history of this fabled sea route.

Day 2 / At Sea

Enjoy the ship's amenities and on board program as we make our way to the Falklands (Malvinas). Our engaging series of lectures and presentations begins.

Day 3 / Saunders Island, West Point Island

We enjoy the long white-sand beach during a morning visit to Saunders Island. A wilderness experience, the main attractions are rockhopper penguins, nesting black-browed albatross, and sub-Antarctic gentoo penguins. In the afternoon, we visit West Point Island. There is an option for an easy hike to a nesting black-browed albatross colony, bird watching, and a typical Falklands tea experience.

Day 4 / Port Stanley

Join our expedition team on guided walking tours of Port Stanley. Or explore on your own and absorb the atmosphere, grabbing lunch at the local pub, visiting the maritime museum, the church, hunting for souvenirs, or walking down Ross Road, paying tribute at the war memorials at the waterfront.

Day 5-6 / At Sea

As we sail towards South Georgia, attend presentations on the history and fauna of the archipelago. In the company of expert guides, watch for wildlife from the lounge or from the outside decks. You may spot magnificent seabirds, such as albatrosses and petrels, as well as different species of whales.

Day 7 / Elsehul Bay

Depending on sea conditions over the previous days, arrival is planned for the afternoon. Provided we receive approval from the South Georgia government, we plan to do an evening Zodiac cruise at Elsehul Bay.

Day 8 / Grytviken, Fortuna Bay

Our first landing could be at Grytviken. We clear Customs and then visit the historical site with the museum and Ernest Shackleton's grave. We land at Fortuna Bay / Stromness in the afternoon to see king penguins. Here, we learn more about Shackleton and his expedition, and there is also an optional 2-3 hour "Shackleton walk."

Day 9 / Gold Harbour, Drygalsky Fjord

In the morning, we plan a landing at Gold Harbour, a spectacular location with king penguins, elephant seals, and hanging glaciers. There are also sooty albatrosses here. If weather allows, we ship cruise across the Drygalsky Fjord in the afternoon.

Day 10 / St Andrews Bay, Ocean Harbour

St Andrews Bay is the destination of our morning excursion. The highlights here are a shipwreck and the remains of the whaling industry. We see one of the world's largest king penguin colonies and elephant seal bulls. We plan a Zodiac cruise in the afternoon and landing at Ocean Harbour.

Day 11 / Salisbury Plain

Depending on weather conditions, we plan to visit Salisbury Plain to observe more king penguins and stunning landscapes. After this morning activity, we start our way back to the Falkland Islands.

Day 12-14 / At Sea

Our education program continues as we make our way back to the Falkland Islands (Islas Malvinas).

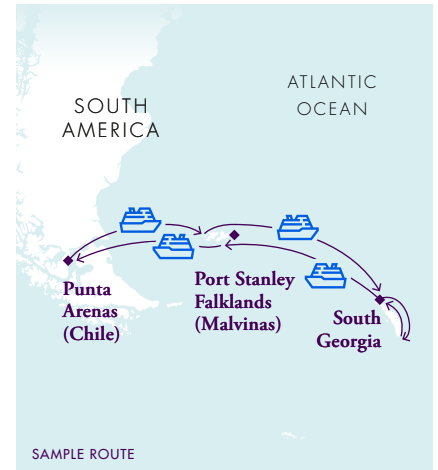

From 10:00 hrs, make your way to Explorers House in Punta Arenas and enjoy Antarctica21's exclusive expedition center. At 15:00 hrs, a group transfer will take you to the port for embarkation. As we sail along the Strait of Magellan, our Expedition Team provides an insightful introduction to the history of this fabled sea route.

Day 2 / At Sea

Enjoy the ship's hospitality as we make our way to the Falklands (Malvinas). Our engaging series of lectures and presentations begins.

Day 3 / Saunders Island, West Point Island

During a morning visit to Saunders Island, we enjoy the long white-sand beach. During this wilderness experience, the main attractions are observing rockhopper penguins, nesting black-browed albatross, and sub-Antarctic gentoo penguins. In the afternoon, we visit West Point Island. There is an option for an easy hike to the settlement, bird watching, and a typical Falklands tea experience.

Day 4 / Port Stanley

Join our expedition team on guided walking tours of Port Stanley or explore on your own and absorb the atmosphere of this isolated outpost in the South Atlantic.

Day 5-6 / At Sea

Day 7 / Elsehul Bay

Evening Zodiac cruise at Elsehul Bay, subject to crossing and permits from the South Georgia government.

Day 8 / Salisbury Plain, Possession Bay

Morning visit to Salisbury Plain to observe king penguins and stunning landscapes. In the afternoon, we will aim to do a zodiac cruise in the stunning Possession Bay or to visit the nearby areas.

In the morning, we visit St. Andrews Bay, home to one of the largest king penguin colonies and impressive elephant seal bulls. If weather allows, we will perform a ship cruise across the Drygalsky Fjord in the afternoon.

Day 11-12 / At sea

Day 13 / Elephant Island

In the afternoon, we explore Elephant Island. While a landing here is unlikely, we will see the island from the ship or, if sea conditions allow, from a Zodiac.

Day 14-17 / Antarctic Peninsula & South Shetland Islands

We cruise along the Antarctic Peninsula and among the South Shetland Islands, visiting sites in the Antarctic Sound and the Gerlache Strait. In the company of expert guides, watch for wildlife from the glass-enclosed lounge or the outside decks. You may spot magnificent sea birds, such as albatrosses and petrels, as well as different species of whales on their way south to Antarctica. After crossing the Antarctic Convergence, the environment changes noticeably. Keep your camera ready, as this is the time to watch for the first icebergs and the sight of Antarctic land.

Day 4-7 / Exploring Antarctica

Cruise between the South Shetland Islands and the western coast of the Antarctic Peninsula, sailing along ice-filled fjords and among spectacular icebergs while enjoying the company of sea birds, penguins, seals, and whales. Each day, disembark by Zodiac boat and explore the landscape together with expert polar guides. Enjoy spectacular vistas from the glass-enclosed lounge of the ship while sharing your daily adventures with fellow guests.

No journey is the same, as flexibility is the key to success in Antarctica. The Expedition Team sets the voyage route to take advantage of the ever-changing opportunities provided by nature, crafting a unique and extraordinary experience each time. While the exact itinerary changes with each expedition, you will explore several locations that offer the best possible overview of the varied Antarctic environment. Your voyage may include visits to sites such as Paulet Island, Hope Bay, Port Lockroy, Petermann Island, Paradise Bay, Deception Island, the Lemaire Channel,

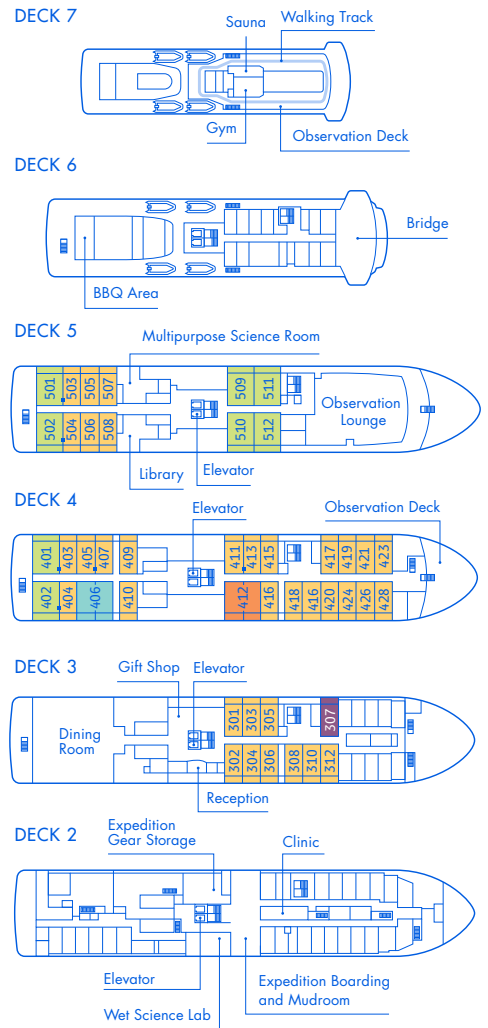

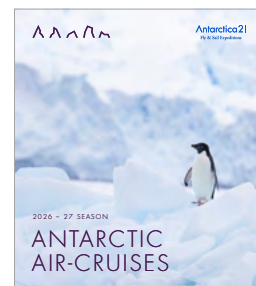

Magellan Explorer

INNOVATIVE TECHNOLOGY · MODERN DESIGN

Magellan Explorer is a modern expedition vessel custom-built for our Antarctic air-cruises. The ship was constructed in Chile to the latest Polar Code specifications and launched in 2019.

Magellan Explorer has seven categories of accommodation, including dedicated single cabins. All cabins except Porthole Cabins feature private balconies. All double cabins, except four, have two twin beds that can be configured as one king-size bed. All cabins feature a wardrobe, an individually controlled heating system, a sitting area, and a private bathroom with a shower.

The ship features a glass-enclosed observation lounge and presentation room with state-of-the-art audio-visual equipment, a spacious and stylish dining room, a well-stocked bar, a library, a meeting room, a gym, a sauna, and a medical clinic. The forward-facing observation deck leads to the ship's bow, which is accessible to guests to offer proximity to marine wildlife. The ship has a fleet of 10 Zodiacs that are well suited for disembarking and wildlife watching.

Children

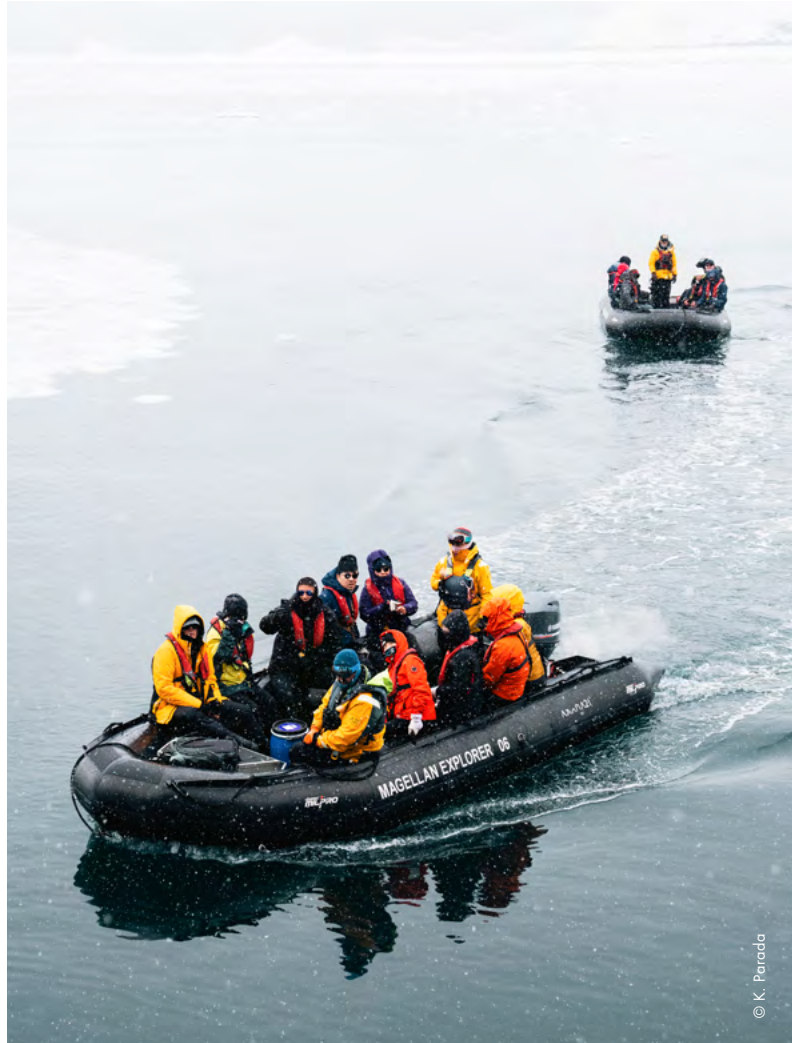

The Program

The sea kayaking program is an optional small-group experience limited to a maximum of 20 participants per expedition who will go on excursions in two separate groups of 10 guests each, on an alternating basis. RESPONSIBLE TRAVELER GUIDELINES

- Never disturb or feed wildlife on land or at sea, allow wildlife to instigate all interactions.
- Don't take souvenirs (for example rocks, feathers, bones, etc.)
- Don't leave anything behind. Take home everything you brought with you.
- Never walk on moss and lichens. It takes years to grow back.
- When ashore, keep at least 5 meters (15 feet) distance from all animals.
- While kayaking, keep at least 100 meters (328 feet) distance from whales and seals.
- Avoid blocking the 'walkways' between penguin colonies and their water entry and exit points.
- Use the provided facilities to decontaminate your boots and help protect the ecosystem from foreign bacteria or seeds.
- There are no bathrooms available at landings in Antarctica. Make sure to use the facilities on board before excursions.



RESPONSIBLE PHOTOGRAPHY GUIDELINES

Always respect animals when taking pictures. Your shot is important, but the wellbeing of wildlife must always take priority.

- Flash photography is not allowed; it might spook the animals.
- Read about Antarctic wildlife species and learn to read their behavior.
- If an animal appears distressed, stop taking photos and move away slowly and immediately.

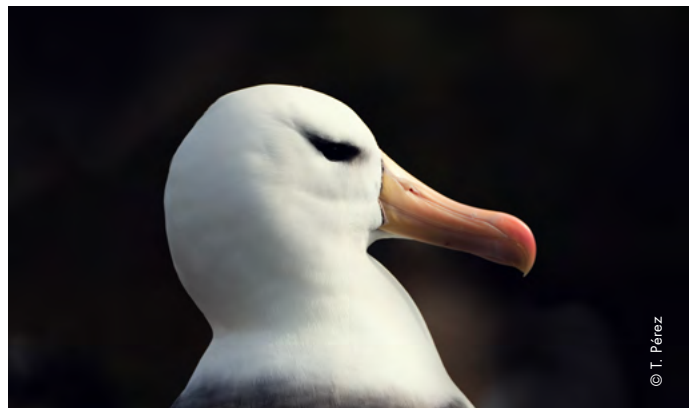

PLANNING YOUR TRIP



Arrival & Departure Details

Review the important details below about arrival and departure for your sea voyage, and make your travel plans accordingly. Ask your booking agent for assistance as needed.

Patagonia & Chilean Fjords

The "Patagonia & Chilean Fjords" itinerary is operated southbound and northbound, depending on the departure date. Ensure that you are clear on the embarkation and disembarkation ports of your departure. The expedition starts at the pier as indicated in the itinerary. Boarding opens at 15:00 hrs and closes at 16:00 hrs. On the last day of the expedition, disembarkation is planned for the morning as indicated in the itinerary, with the trip ending at the pier.

Falklands (Malvinas) & South Georgia

For "The Falklands & South Georgia" itinerary, on Day 1 in Punta Arenas, from 10:00 hrs, make your way to Explorers House and enjoy the facilities. At 15:00 hrs, a transfer to the ship will be provided. Upon arrival at Punta Arenas, on the last day of the expedition, we disembark and take a group transfer to the town's center where the expedition will end. Explorers House remains available to you for the day.

Falklands (Malvinas), South Georgia & Antarctica

For the "Falklands (Malvinas), South Georgia & Antarctica" itinerary, on Day 1 in Punta Arenas, from 10:00 hrs, make your way to Explorers House and enjoy the facilities. At 15:00 hrs, a transfer to the ship will be provided. On the last day of the expedition, disembarkation in Ushuaia is planned in the morning. However, delays are possible. Antarctica21 strongly suggests that any travel plans made for the last day of the expedition do not start until the late afternoon.

Antarctic Small Ship Expedition

The "Antarctic Small Ship Expedition" itinerary starts at the pier in Ushuaia, and boarding is between 15:00 hrs and 16:00 hrs. At 16:00 hrs boarding will close. On the last day of the expedition, disembarkation in Ushuaia is planned in the morning. However, delays are possible. Antarctica21 strongly suggests that any travel plans made for the last day of the expedition do not start until the late afternoon.

Traveling to and from your Antarctic gateway

Flights between Ushuaia and Buenos Aires' Ezeiza International Airport and Aeroparque Domestic Airport are available daily on a few airlines. Buenos Aires can easily be accessed with many international flights that land daily at Ezeiza International Airport.

Many international airlines land daily at Santiago's Arturo Merino Benitez International Airport. Several airlines offer daily service between Santiago and Punta Arenas.

Overland transportation by bus between Ushuaia and Punta Arenas, a 12-hour journey, is also available.

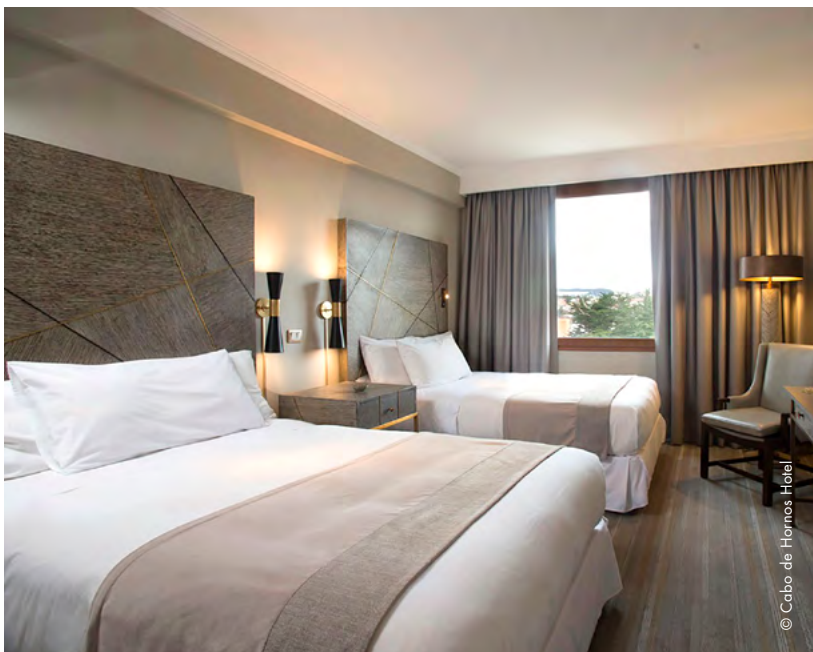

Packing For Your Trip

Suggested Clothing

The average temperature in the Falkland Islands (Islas Malvinas) during the time of our visit is in the 5 – 10 °C (40 – 50 °F) range. The average temperature in South Georgia and the Antarctic Peninsula area during the time of our visit is about 0 °C (32 °F), although sometimes it may feel a little lower because of the wind chill factor. For this reason, it is best to wear several layers of light, warm clothing. The suggested clothing for Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic regions is very similar to that recommended for skiing: thermal underwear, a couple of warm and wicking mid-layers, a windproof and waterproof jacket, plus pants as the outer layer. You will also need a hat, a scarf, waterproof and insulated gloves, and sunglasses with high UV protection. The pre-departure material provides further details. We also suggest packing comfortable clothes to wear on board, as well as rubber-soled shoes for walking around on the outside decks.

Waterproof Boots & Clothing

As most landings in Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic regions are "wet landings," the best footwear is knee-high waterproof boots. You will not need to carry them with you since Antarctica21 will provide you with a pair of thermal rubber boots.

Make sure you pack waterproof outer layers to keep dry during Zodiac excursions and landings.

Face Protection

Good quality UV filtering sunglasses are essential. Glacier glasses have leather flaps at the sides to stop the light from passing through. Due to the high reflectance of UV radiation, you will also need good sunblock lotion for your face (protection factor 30 and above) and lip balm.

Photography

To see the wildlife, you should have a good pair of lightweight binoculars (the suggested magnification is 7× or 8×). If you are passionate about photography, do not forget a good zoom lens to shoot wildlife while avoiding close approaches. Also, take a good supply of memory cards and spare batteries with you since cold temperatures can reduce their life span. The recreational use of drones is not allowed during the expedition.

Visa Requirements

It is the traveler's responsibility to check the entry requirements of the countries visited during their trip, based on their nationality. For trips that visit Argentina, Chile, and the UK, the requirements of these countries should be considered. Please note that if you require a visa, it must be a multiple-entry visa to ensure compliance with travel requirements.

Dietary Information

Requests regarding diets must be made on the Participation Form you receive after your booking confirmation. This information will be passed along to our staff so they can accommodate your needs while on your voyage.

Important Trip Details

The Nature of Expedition Travel

Our expeditions are suitable for adventurous travelers who enjoy full mobility and reasonably good health. Expedition travel to Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic regions requires flexibility and adaptation to ever-changing circumstances.

Expedition Language

The official language of our expeditions is English. The voyage will take travelers to remote destinations where interaction with our polar guides is essential. In the interest of safety and for the enjoyment of the experience, we strongly recommend that travelers who do not understand English be accompanied by someone who does, such as a friend, a family member, or a Tour Leader.

Your Travel Companions

Antarctica21 offers its expeditions worldwide. Each year, we welcome travelers from over 40 different countries. They may travel alone, as a family, or as part of a group. While some of your traveling companions may speak different languages and have different customs, they will share your passion for adventure and interest in the natural world.

Participation Form

Participants are required to fill out and sign an online Participation Form and return it to Antarctica21 at least 90 days prior to departure.

Medical Insurance

It is mandatory that participants to be adequately covered by a travel insurance policy that covers aero-medical evacuation from any of the destinations included in your selected itinerary in the case of a medical emergency during the trips, including emergencies related to pre-existing health conditions.

Cancellation Insurance

Antarctica21 strongly urges participants to be adequately covered by trip cancellation and interruption insurance.

Itinerary

Every effort will be made to adhere to the planned program. However, with this type of adventurous travel, changes to the itinerary may occur due to severe and changeable weather. We need to emphasize the fact that weather conditions are unpredictable, and safety is always the paramount concern on any Antarctic voyage. For this reason, Antarctica21 reserves the right to change the itinerary described due to weather conditions or other factors beyond Antarctica21's control without consulting the participants.

Baggage

We recommend that clients avoid expensive designer luggage that is easily damaged. We also strongly recommend that clients take out a luggage insurance policy that covers the cost of repairs or replacement in case their luggage is damaged. Due to the nature of the expedition, and as stated in our Terms and Conditions of Sale, Antarctica21 cannot be responsible for any damage to a customer's luggage.

Note that at certain points during the expedition, you will be required to handle your own luggage.

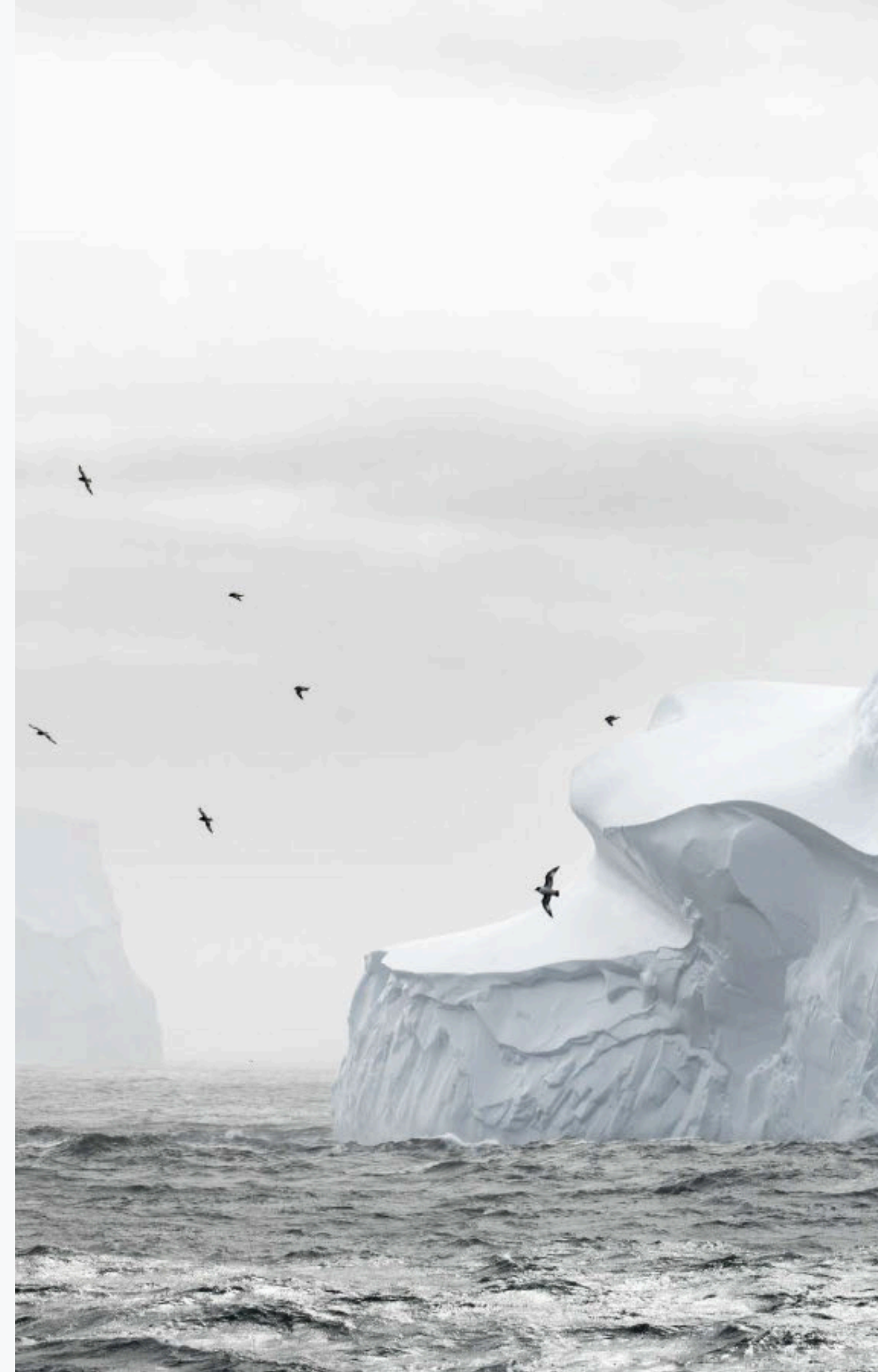
